Open Enrollment Appeal — Open Enrollment was held at bay again this past session. We are thankful for all of those districts who have passed a BOE Resolution in opposition to Open Enrollment. The list has grown (attached) and now sits at 259 school districts opposed, impacting 454,600 student lives in Missouri. The list has been noticed by various legislators and it has had an impact! We are appealing to the other 257 or so public-school districts to take action and pass the attached resolution in opposition. Our hope is that if the number continues to grow, legislators will have to seriously consider the issue before casting a vote when the issue comes up again in the 2026 session. ## Moniteau Co. R-V (Latham) – On the Farm!



For many small, rural school districts maintaining enrollment is critical, the loss of even a few students can be the difference between consolidation and staying open. During the 24-25 school year, Latham Elementary, a K-8 district in Moniteau County picked up several new students: Petunia, Wilbur, Penelope, Flora, Harlee, Tate, Georgia and Joker. They were just not the kind of students that drive ADA. They were more of the 4-legged variety. With the completion of their on-site barn, their animal enrollment grew to eight. Two mini goats, 2 mini cows, 2 mini ponies and two teacup pigs. They have since added a bottle calf named June to the enrollment!

With the addition of the farm animals came many lessons, some intentional, and others equally valuable, but unintended. According to Latham Elementary Principal Tracey Bieri, the rationale behind starting a small farm on the elementary school grounds was to help students learn about problem solving, responsibility, respect, empathy and an appreciation for rural life. From an academic standpoint students covered standards found in the science and English Language Arts curriculum.

But as so often in life some of the most important lessons learned were ones that the district had not even considered when they dreamed up their school farm. The students in upper grades learned patience, tolerance and acceptance as they helped the younger students with the animals. The students all learned what it meant to be a part of a larger community and work together to achieve goals.

They learned when you are having a bad day there is nothing like a small pig eating out of your hand to help cheer you up. They learned the challenging and time-consuming lesson of what happens when you leave a gate open on the farm. They learned the valuable lesson

of always being aware of your surroundings, especially around animals and to look out for each other and to help keep each other safe.

Their school farm, much like many small, rural farms extended beyond animals, with a greenhouse and raised beds of vegetables. They learned about the economics of growing and selling hanging baskets. They learned the art of salesmanship when they sold out the greenhouse and made over \$1,400 in profit in less than an hour. Each class also grew vegetables to eat.

For many students it was their first taste of turnips or radishes or mustard greens. The plan as they move into the future with their garden is to raise enough vegetables so they can use some of the produce in their cafeteria. As a part of the agriculture curriculum there is also a focus on self-sufficiency, students learned how to make cheese and butter, although they confided the texture was "kinda gross." Next year the school plans to use the vegetables from the garden to teach students how to can vegetables.

In combination with the many skills the students are learning by their active participation in the school farm, Latham has a strong STEM program. All the raised garden beds are marked by grade with acrylic signs the students designed and made on their glow forge machine. They recently acquired 3-D printers and each class learned to design and print products, everything from mini thermos cup keychains to wiggly toys; with the plan for next year to look for needs around the school and use the 3-D printers to create products to address those needs.

Latham students are also learning the skills of entrepreneurship. Students in grades five through eight created, marketed and sold a product, everything from meat seasonings to dehydrated fruits. The students shared what they learned, "When you make and sell products it is not all profit. You have to pay back for what you bought." According to Rylee, they are also learning to speak to people about their product, understand the economics of pricing and how to manage costs."

Bieri believes that the additional time and effort put in by her staff to incorporate the school farm is a benefit for her students. "Kids who may not be the top students in traditional academics have an opportunity to shine. This provides them an outlet where they can share their expertise. All of our students have talents, we must help them realize and celebrate them."

The Latham School Farm has been a positive addition to the Latham School District and a point of pride for the community. The positive emotional benefit of having animals and plants to care for has benefited all the students and staff. As one student responded when asked about why other districts should consider adding a farm, "It makes the day more bearable."

Plans are underway to make the 25-26 school year even more successful, and the excitement continues to grow with the students as they move from grade to grade and assume more responsibility and ownership in the success of the school farm. 

# Important Update for Missouri School Districts: Declining MO HealthNet Eligibility Rates Could Impact Services and Reimbursement

As Missouri School Districts begin the 2025-2026 school year, many are experiencing a significant decline in student eligibility for MO HealthNet. Claim Care has observed this ongoing trend across the majority of our districts, with the most substantial drop occurring during the spring and summer of 2025.

#### **Why This Matters for Your District**

Reduced MO HealthNet eligibility rates can directly reduce reimbursement through several state programs including Direct IEP Therapy, Cost-Based Settlement, and SDAC. More critically, it can jeopardize access to essential medical services for students who rely on them.

#### What's Causing the Drop in Eligibility?

The Missouri Family Support Division (FSD) has resumed its annual review process for all MO HealthNet participants. As a result, more than 1.5 million Missourians are undergoing eligibility redetermination—many of whom may lose coverage simply due to outdated contact information or missed renewal notices.

#### What Can Districts Do?

District staff play a vital role in helping families maintain coverage. Please encourage parents and guardians to:

- Watch for a yellow MO HealthNet annual renewal form in the mail.
- Update their contact information and report any changes by one of the following:
  - Visiting mydss.mo.gov and selecting "Report a Change"
  - o Calling (855) 373-4636
  - Visiting their local Family Support Division Resource Center

#### What is MO HealthNet?

MO HealthNet is Missouri's Medicaid program, providing health insurance coverage for eligible children, families, seniors, and individuals with disabilities. The program supports school-based services such as therapy, nursing, and transportation when included in a student's IEP.
